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INTRODUCTION TO DANIEL

Welcome to Daniel - a book of extreme circumstances and wild visions. A book of earth-shattering dreams and beastly kingdoms. A book that can feel so foreign to us in 21st century Australia that it can be hard to understand what God is saying to us through it. But in fact this is a book that is completely relevant to us today in ways that will both comfort us and challenge us as we live as disciples of Jesus right here and now.

It is firstly important to understand the original context of Daniel. In response to Israel's continued rebellion against him God sends his people into exile, and Daniel and his friends are carried off by the foreign power Babylon. They find themselves in this grand city that is the centre of the greatest empire of the time. There they will be tempted to conform to the culture of Babylon. One choice they face is submit to the pressure and let go of their identity and faith, or revolt against the empire. But what we actually see is Daniel and his friends choosing a third way of serving Babylon and contributing to its well-being, while still remaining faithful to God. Daniel and his friends are people of God remaining faithful in the midst of all that exile brings – all because God remains faithful to them.

So how does this relate to us? It can feel like exile is something distant to most of us, yet in 1 Peter 2 all followers of Jesus are urged to live as "foreigners and exiles". We are called to live in this world - tempted by a Babylon-like culture - knowing that our true home is yet to come. Like Daniel, we are to resist the temptation to conform or revolt, but instead find ways to be faithful exiles in the Babylons of our day, in which God has placed us. We can only do this because we are no longer exiled from God's presence but are now part of God's eternal kingdom through the risen Son of Man, Jesus.

Our prayer this term, is that we can have Jesus revealed to us more clearly through the lens of the book of Daniel. Pray that we will see that the fragile kingdoms of this world will continue to rise and fall along with all the anxieties that they bring; that we can find strength & comfort in the fact that we are part of an everlasting kingdom that will never pass away, and will never be destroyed. Pray that as Jesus remains faithful to us, we can remain faithful to him, and that we can resist the world's attempts to conform us to its image. Pray that we will endure to the end as resilient, non-anxious, faithful exiles taking up all the opportunities presented to us give the reason for the hope we have.

USING THESE SERIES COMPANIONS

Preparation is key – listening to the talk and answering the questions before Growth Group are excellent ways to prepare.

Included for the first time in this Series Companion is a section entitled "This Week". This is designed to help each of us change to become more like Jesus. Words on a page won't bring about individual change, but if we write possible changes down, ask trusted friends to keep us accountable and then pray together with someone who loves us and loves God – we're getting serious about growth – which after all is what Growth Groups are all about.

There are more questions than is possible to discuss in one Growth Group event – so the Growth Group Leader or in some cases the group can select a smaller number of questions for discussion together.

There are different types of questions – so it is good to check every now and again that your group is discussing a range of question types.







- 8. Belshazzar is not humble. He is thinking more highly of himself than he ought. How often do we fall into that trap?
- 9. What does it tell us about the human heart?

Read 1 Peter 3:13-22

Reflect on this passage silently for a couple of minutes.

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Week seven

AUTHORITY OVER THE BEASTS

This week we examine how to respond to the violence of this world, while knowing that God establishes and sustains his everlasting kingdom that is our home.

- 6. What is the simple message from this passage?
- 7. How do you feel when you read verses 13-14 and 26-27?

READ

Daniel 7

As we enter the chapters of Daniel that are known as apocalyptic literature, we have actually been prepared well by reading about the dreams in Daniel 1-6. The imagery of these dreams give us a glimpse of heavenly realities that point to Jesus as the eternal king over all.
